

he records—for peanuts, embalmers, hansom cabs-are sometimes beautiful and sometimes banal but always worth a second look. Though Jump has had an extensive show at the New-York Historical Society, his best work has found a permanent home on the Web (www.frankjump.com). This week, some of his photos come to a neighborhood rich in both faded beauty and original art for the Williamsburg Art & Historical Center's Fading Ad Campaign: The Brooklyn Signs 1870-1970 (including, pictured, one for a Jewish shoe factory in the neighborhood). Jump, who is HIV-positive and whose exhibit is part of the worldwide "Day Without Art," explains part of his motivation: "Like myself," he writes in his bio, "many of these images of fading advertisements have long outlived their expected lifespan." The gallery exhibit—in which all objects are for sale—is named for Project Renewal's ongoing art class, a program designed specifically to teach homeless people how to profit from self-expression. "The Television Comedy of George Carlin"

A 90-minute screening package at the museum through early March includes original footage Carlin recorded for the show, in which he discusses his career and comments on famous clips like "Wonderful WINO Radio," "Seven Words You Can Never Use on Television," his HBO specials, and four decades' worth of TV guest appearances.
